2021 Year End Report Media Coverage

The Death Penalty Information Center's <u>2021 Year End Report</u> was released on December 16, 2021, and received extensive coverage in hundreds of print, online, television, and radio news outlets across the United States and around the world.

Coverage reflected the report and its accompanying press materials, including their most important theme: The long-term erosion of the death penalty continued in 2021, and the jurisdictions who used the punishment did so with apparent disregard for due process, judicial review of execution methods, or potentially meritorious claims of intellectual disability, incompetence to be executed, and innocence. Even though the pandemic played a role in reduced numbers of executions and new death sentences, coverage emphasized that the death penalty is still declining across the country. Virginia's historic role as the first southern state to abolish the death penalty — especially with its history of slavery, Jim Crow, and lynchings — was also highlighted.

An Associated Press article carried by hundreds of outlets across the U.S. used DPIC data to create an original graph that showed the decline of executions since 1972 — and emphasized the federal government's historically aberrant behavior in 2020 and the beginning of 2021.

Other outlets brought attention to the decline of the death penalty and how repeal bills are being pursued by both Democratic- and Republican-controlled legislatures. "What we've been seeing is a persistent slow erosion. It's an erosion that's occurring all over the country," DPIC Executive Director Robert Dunham told the Wall Street Journal. In an interview that ran on more than 80 public radio stations across the country as part of National Public Radio's (NPR) top-of-the-hour news, Robert said, "From a state perspective, the death penalty is disappearing one by one by one. That's happening in Democratic states, it's happening in Republican states."

A Washington Post article that quoted Robert numerous times highlighted jurisdictions where the death penalty was carried out despite serious failures and explained how those failures contribute to the public's continuing decline in support for the punishment. "It's this kind of extreme conduct," Robert told the newspaper, "that is having long-term effects on the public's view of the death penalty. Even if people support the death penalty in the abstract, they are losing faith in the ability to carry it out properly."

Many stories cited DPIC Deputy Director Ngozi Ndulue's quote from DPIC's press release accompanying the report: "We are seeing fewer and fewer executions, but those that do occur demonstrate that the death penalty is not reserved for the worst of the worst, but the most vulnerable of the vulnerable."

In addition to the NPR story, radio stories blanketed the nation with more than 20 CBS stations, more than three ABC stations, more than 30 Fox stations, and more than 20 iHeart Radio stations across the country carrying stories about the report.
